Third International Abalone Symposium

The Third International Abalone Symposium was held at the Asilomar Conference Center on the Monterey Peninsula in October 1997. Three days of scientific papers, a day of workshops and abalone farm tours were attended by abalone researchers, aquaculturists, fishermen, students and fishery biologists from fourteen countries. This symposium continued the tradition of enthusiastic involvement established by the La Paz and Hobart meetings. Over 130 papers and posters were presented on abalone aquaculture, fisheries management, ecology, biotechnology, genetics, nutrition, population biology, ocean ranching, and pathology. A limited number of the book of abstracts are still available from Susan McBride (see address below) for \$15.00. The symposium proceedings will be published as a special issue of the Journal of Shellfish Research. Papers are currently in review and we hope to publish the Proceedings by the summer of 1998.


Highlights of the Symposium included the organization of the International Abalone Society. A general meeting was held, symposium participants voted to form the Society, and officers and an executive council were elected. Membership is \$10.00 per year for an individual and \$20.00 per year (US

dollars) for businesses. Functions of the new society are to increase international communication, exchange research material, hold international and regional meetings, manage a bank account, maintain a data base of abalone researchers, aquaculturists, resource managers and enthusiasts, provide communication between industry and researchers, and maintain ABNET. Membership is available by contacting Susan McBride.

At the first meeting of the new Executive Council, honorary life memberships in the Society were made and then awarded by Scoresby Shepherd at the Symposium banquet held at the Monterey Bay Aquarium. They were presented to Martin Ortiz Quintanilla, Katherine Stewart, and David Leighton.

The Fourth International Abalone Symposium will be held in South Africa in the year 2000. Peter Cook is Chair of the Organizing Committee.

SHELLFISH LISTSERVER UPDATE

Attention SHELLFISH listserver subscribers:

The Shellfish listserver is being plagued by more and more bad e-mail addresses of late. This almost always happens during the holiday season, but this year, the number of subscribers that have had to be removed from the list has been very high.

How does this happen? If your e-mail address changes in any way, postings from SHELLFISH cannot reach you unless you unsubscribe using your old e-mail address and resubscribe using your new e-mail address. I don't remove anyone from the list if their server is temporarily down, etc. Addresses are removed only when your local e-mail server reports your e-mail address as "User Unknown." I take this to mean that you are no longer at that institution, or your e-mail address has changed.

If you or someone you know used to receive SHELL-FISH postings but no longer does, this may explain why!

Using the e-mail address under which you are currently subcribed, send to SHELLFISH-REQUEST@KENYON.EDU a mail message containing in the body of the message the single word UNSUBSCRIBE

To resubscribe:

Using your current e-mail address, send to SHELLFISH-REQUEST@KENYON.EDU a mail message containing in the body of the message the single word SUBSCRIBE.

Book Review

Harbo, Rick M. 1997. Shells & Shellfish of the Pacific Northwest. Harbour Publishing, P.O. Box 219, Madeira Park, BC, V0N 2H0, Canada. 270 pages, illustrated with 350 color photos, bibliography, checklist, glossary of terms, glossary of meanings of scientific names, and index. ISBN 1-55017-146-1, \$24.95 paperback.

The author's goal was to make it easy for persons interested in Pacific Northwest seashore life to identify more than 200 species of shelled molluscs -- and one lonely brachiopod. In general, he has succeeded. Each species has two entries; one, usually illustrated by a color photograph, gives the mollusc's size, geographic range, and habitat; the other, toward the back of the book, repeats most of this information, then provides a brief description of the shell, and sometimes of other features. Most of the species occur intertidally (but some are rare!) and can be identified on the basis of the descriptions and illustrations; for some, however, additional information will be necessary. A case in point is that of clams of the genus Macoma, represented in the Northwest by several species. Some of these species are mostly subtidal and also a bit difficult to identify positively from a photograph and a limited description of size and shape.

Commons names are provided for all species, and in most cases these are appropriate. The main exceptions are those that perpetuate obsolete genus names; for example, Robust Mysella, for Rochefortia tumida, and Violet-band Mangelia, for Kurtziella crebricostata. Some scientific names may be unfamiliar to biologists who deal with molluscs of the region. This is because the author has informed hinself about changes that have been proposed in recent publications. Ostrea conchaphila, for instance, is claimed to have priority over the very well known Ostrea lurida. We may have to wait a while to see which changes will stick.

This is a pleasing and helpful little book, and will be of use to students, amateur naturalists, and many professionals.

Workshop on Marine Aquaculture Technology

Connecticut Sea Grant and the University of Connecticut Biotechnology Center are planning to sponsor an International Workshop on Marine Aquaculture Technology sometime in early June. The two-day workshop will be held on the University of Connecticut campus in Storrs, or at a nearby facility. The purpose of this announcement is to publicize the workshop theme and structure, and solicit the interest of potential speakers and attendees from the National Sea Grant Network, including the government, academia and industry customers that we serve.

The workshop is an outgrowth of several aquaculture projects undertaken by Connecticut Sea Grant and the Biotechnology Center and will be similar in format to a technical exchange forum on the Aquaculture of Abalone, Sea Urchins, Lobsters and Kelp held in Galway, Ireland in November, 1992. The workshop will focus specifically on the role of biotechnology in support of marine aquaculture, and the feasibility of using shore-based recirculating aquaculture systems to produce high-value, niche-market species (such as abalone and sea urchins). Presentations are being solicited from researchers and practitioners in the United States Peoples Republic of China, Ireland and elsewhere. A proceedings containing extended abstracts will be published.
